

The Hop Leaf Gazette was the 'In House' magazine of H&G Simonds Ltd brewery. First published in October 1926, it was circulated until the brewery's merger with Courage in the Autumn of 1961, when the Simonds name and hop-leaf log was dropped. Up until the mid-1950's, the Gazette would occassionally include updates on the League's progress, including the extracts below in relation to its inaugural season.
